They were: Flying-Officer Norman Lewis Parker, pilot, Geraldton, W.A.; Sgt. Neville Martin Tyack, navigator, Caulfield, Victoria; Flt.-Lieut. Arthur Curlew H. Young, pilot, Newcastle, N.S.W.; Flt.-Lieut. Arthur George Hodges, navigator, Casino, N.S.W. All four bodies were recovered.
